

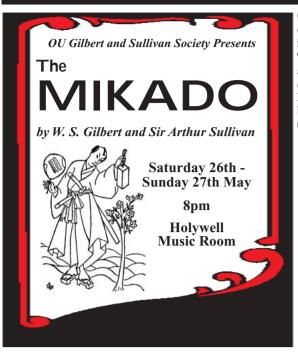

THE WOMAN IN BLACK BY SUSAN HILL

PLAYHOUSE UNTIL SATURDAY 26TH

I write this review looking over my shoulder. It's late, I'm alone in the house, and I have just sat through a play so terrifying that it moved its audience to scream out loud more than once (and then laugh nervously for being so silly). Buoyed up by the programme and the promised terrors ahead, 50% of said audience jumped and gasped as the pre-performance

Arthur Kipps (Frank Barrie) hires a young Actor (Damien Matthews) to teach him to relate the story of his real-life experiences concerning the malevolent Woman in Black. Before

long, the Actor has revamped the tale as a performance piece for two men, with himself playing the young Kipps with a manic over-caffeinated energy. Arthur Kipps plays all the incidental characters in the story, and as the end to the tale slides into view, the aged Kipps can only look on in despair and helplessness at the zeal of youth as tragic history threatens to repeat itself.

There are two actors in front of us on a stage, purporting to be actors rehearsing a play in a creepy-looking theatre. There are no special effects. No laser ghosts. No clever flying tricks. Instead, our fear is manipulated through simple sound, lighting and the sheer brilliance of both

My companion said she didn't want the play to end, but during the second half, as I peered through my fingers, I'd got to the stage where my nerves couldn't take much more...

The plot of the actual ghost story is not really the point of the play. As with most horror

PREVIEW

THE MIKADO, by Gilbert and Sullivan

Holywell Music Room, Saturday 26th-Sunday 27th May, 8pm

This month sees the opening of the Japan 2001 Festival. Running until March 2002, and involving events in venues the length and breadth of Britain, the festival seeks to give English audiences an opportunity to appreciate the art and culture of a country which still, even in this jetpropelled age, seems fascinatingly remote. What more appropriate time, then, to perform Gilbert & Sullivan's *The Mikado*, for it was a Japanese Festival in London in 1885 which provided the inspiration for this most popular of all the G & S operettas, and, in the process, saved probably the most successful partnership in British Musical History.

After composing *Princess Ida*, Sullivan decided that it was about time to end his lucrative partnership with Gilbert. This may have been because receipts for Ida, in the long hot summer of 1884, were not good; more probably it was because he felt he should devote more time to "serious" composition. Either way, Gilbert was unable to tempt him with a new libretto. Until, that is, he visited the Japanese exhibition at Knightsbridge, and purchased a ceremonial sword. Having hung it on the wall of his study, he thought no more about it until, when the

author was working late one night, the sword fell in front of him with a crash. The idea for a Japanese opera took root in Gilbert's mind; Sullivan was carried away by the notion; and the partnership went on to produce seven more master-pieces of musical theatre.

Ironically, though *The Mikado* is supposedly set in Japan, it is almost as if both librettist and composer found their own national voices more fully in the contemplation of another culture. Sullivan, who less than a year before had claimed that his ingenuity for comic opera was exhausted, produced his most ebulliently, melo-diously English score. The few bars of quasi-orispring-boarded him into fresh heights of Victorian gaiety. Gilbert, in placing the action in what must have seemed the most foreign of countries, Japan, and attiring its characters in fantastically exotic garb, contrived to create his most English libretto to date. The Mikado's characters are even larger than life, and even more unmistakably English than usual; and in no other Savoy Opera does Gilbert produce a "little list" of Eng lish types who could be profitably exterminated

This new production from Oxford University's Gilbert and Sullivan Society aims to capture

the exotic flavour of the original, while updating the already biting political satire to hilariously topical effect: politicians campaigning this week will have to watch their step if they want to avoid being included on the Lord High Executioner's Little List when it is unveiled this Saturday. Performed in the perfect acoustics of the Holywell Music Room, the emphasis of this production is on Sullivan's sparkling music: some of it being among the most famous music

ever composed. The cast contains many fine voices - the large ensemble numbers are uplifting by their sheer volume - and a good mix of G & S veterans (you may rec-ognize both the Pirate King and the Sergeant of Police from January's *Pirates of Penzance*) and fresh new talent. Altogether, an hilarious, melodious and thor-English evening's entertainment.

The Japan 2001 festival comes to Oxford on 9th June. Living Japan: Arts in Practice is
